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NOTES FROM THE VILLAGE BOARD METTING

The monthly meeting of the Village Board was held February 10th. The Water Department reported that the drinking water facility was fine, but the waste water plant had had to replace some equipment parts due to the freezing weather. The Fire Department has already had three calls in February and continues its usual skills-training classes and the time-consuming maintenance of its equipment. The DPW crew has been doing an amazing job under dreadful weather conditions. Bravo!

In answer to the Village's appeal for additional funds to cover the monies spent on the construction of the Rip Rap at the Campground, FEMA has sent a letter of acceptance in the amount of \$365,663. An amendment to the project worksheet will be prepared to include the engineering and inspection fees as well.

A letter was received from NYS Department of Environmental Conservation approving the engineering plans and specifications for the Village's trunk sewer reconstruction from Manhole #13 to the wastewater treatment plant.

A Public Hearing will be held at 6:30 pm, just prior to the scheduled March Village Board Meeting at 7:00 pm., to discuss the tax-cap override and, also, zoning.

Wonderful news! All the electrical problems, that kept Port Henry in the dark this past Christmas, are finally solved! Not only will next Christmas be lovely, but there will be summer benefits also. The Park will be lit, the Info Booth will have its own light source, as will the Oval.

Village Elections are coming up March 18th at the Fire House. Polls will be open from 12:00 – 9:00 pm. There are two Village Trustee positions up for election. You must be a registered voter of the Village of Port Henry to be allowed to vote. If you are not registered, or are not sure whether you are,

you may contact The Essex County Board of Elections at 873-3474 by March 7th. Each resident has not only the right but a responsibility to vote. Your vote will be especially important in this next election, as there are three candidates vying for two Trustee openings. I am sure the winners would like to know they were chosen rather than that they won by accident of non-voter interest.

FROM THE TOWN SUPERVISOR'S DESK

I just returned from the annual Association of Towns meeting in New York City. There were many informative sessions, with the focus on the Governor's proposal for property tax relief. The concept of the proposal is that any taxing jurisdiction that stays within the 2% tax cap limit, can show that they are "sharing" service's with another taxing jurisdiction (Schools, Villages, Counties) and meet the requirements for a two year period, then the property tax payers will receive a rebate check from the state. This sounds good, but there are also many problems associated with the proposal. For instance, the taxing unit that takes on the "shared service" will obviously have additional costs associated with providing the service. Another issue is what happens if one unit of government stays within the cap, but the other units exceed the cap, what happens to the rebate? Also there are many restrictions as what any taxing jurisdiction can do "outside their taxing jurisdiction." The reason is that most schools, towns, villages and special districts all have geographical areas where specific taxes can be billed for a service. I fully endorse the concept of the tax cap, and also the sharing of services and even the elimination of some units of government. Although the Governor's proposal has many hurdles, he is on the right track and, at the very least, has started good discussion on the property tax problem within this state. The Town Board will work with the school and also the village to try and find ways to reduce "costs" and hold the line on property taxes. I will keep you updated as this proposal is fine-tuned.

To help build back the sense of community that existed when trees lined Main Street and Port Henry had all the businesses it needed to be self-sufficient enough that people could find whatever they needed within walking distance, even a movie for entertainment. It can't be exactly the same (nor should it be) but we shall become self-sufficient and prosperous again, just in different ways. As Trustees, we hope we shall be able to help, if only in small ways, to move closer toward this goal.
