I love sending special cards to the people I love and I found the beautiful "Leanin' Tree" cards at *Synchronicity* to be perfect for my needs and I laughed out loud at a couple of the humorous ones.

The Moriah Chamber of Commerce held its monthly meeting Tuesday 8th. Attendees were Jeff, Linda, Gayle, Cathy, David, Ronnie, Janell, myself and our guest speaker Chris Maron of CATS (Champlain Area Trails). CATS is a Land Trust organization and spoke about the trails (almost fifty) in our area. CATS is particularly interested in connecting trail to trail. He showed us slides of him and his family hiking in France this past summer. He would switch back and forth between pictures of France and the Adirondacks, showing similarities and differences and the good ideas which could be adapted for American hiking. He handed out a wonderful map and an information brochure. The Chamber then settled down to the business part of its meeting. David Koran said the Chamber website is completed and ready for use. The Champ Day Planning Committee's next meeting will be in early April when Jackie returns. It was decided that a band would be hired for Champ Day. The Fleury's pizza oven had not arrived as of this meeting, so a ribbon-cutting date could not be set. The information sign next to the Champ sightings' sign <u>must</u> be updated. At least seven listed businesses do not exist anymore and there may be other changes needed. I said I could make these changes. The Chamber decided to give a Town/Village Easter Egg Hunt for all the children on Saturday the 26th in front of the Town Hall, to begin at 11 am. The Chamber's next monthly meeting will be April 2nd in the Chamber office at 4 PM. <u>Note</u> to Chamber Member businesses: the Chamber display decals are here and may be picked up at the office whenever the Open Flag is out.

TOWN BOARD MEETING NOTES FOR MARCH

After a short wait, Deputy Supervisor Paul Salerno decided to begin the meeting with reports from department heads. Ed Roberts (Building and Grounds) reported that because of the warm weather they had been able to begin clearing away the accumulated winter garbage. Code Enforcement's Richard Lapier noted that the Town's International-Code-Based Code had received about a hundred page update to be incorporated into their existing Code. Moriah Central's Tom Anderson was very pleased to announce that all three directors necessary for the school's 2016 Summer Youth Program had been hired. Although this summer's program will remain free, he is

afraid there will have to be some charge for the 2017 summer program because of rising prices and the minimum wage requirement. He mentioned that Moriah seems to be the only Town that does not charge for its school's summer program. Trustee Luci Carpenter had been researching security cameras for the campground as insurers require a certain level of security. She felt there needed to be further research on the subject. [A note for plan-making: the campground will open May 6th and close October 9th.] At this point, Supervisor Scazzafava joined the meeting. He had been one of a large, damp crowd of well-wishers lining Main Street to see Moriah Central's amazing Viking basketball team off for the Civic Center in Glens Falls and their next game. *Fact Finder just heard that they won today and will play tomorrow for the Class D State Championship! Fact Finder congratulates you on your success and hopes it continues*.

Report on the yearly water tests found no problems, however, both State and National standards will become more stringent. Complete water tests results are published in the Ti Sun.

Finally the Town received a partial payment of \$213,477 for the beach erosion repair.

The Board adopted a Public Interest Order and Bond Resolution for the Titus Road Pump Station, which had become an emergency situation caused by 30 year old pumps. Now its efficiency is an amazing change.

The Board authorized a 20% local match for Inflow & Infiltration Planning Grant not to exceed \$4,800. The grant is for \$24,000.

The Board has to purchase eight radios for the Town trucks because of something the County changed about its system. FF did not understand too well, really, not at all. It was a short meeting.
